BBC Plans Protest To U. S. TV Chains Relative To Barbs

LONDON, June 7.—The British Broadcasting Corp. is considering a protest to U. S. television networks on the advertising commercials transmitted in America in conjunction with video coverage of the coronation, for which the BBC provided the films.

A spokesman said today the BBC would determine what protest should be made as soon as a report from New York on the interlarding of the coronation transmissions with advertising "plugs" had been received and studied.

Gilbert Harding, a commentator in the People, a mass circulation Sunday newspaper, charged that the advertising interludes in the American transmissions constituted a breach of a gentlemen's agreement under which the BBC made the coronation films available to U. S. transmitters.

"As the more solemn parts of President Eisenhower's inauguration were broadcast without plugs in America, there was no reason why they (the U. S. transmitters) should have gone out of their way to offend against good taste in Britain," Mr. Harding concluded.

The BBC said the unwritten agreement to which Mr. Harding referred was that there should be no commercial interruption of the video film record of the ceremonies inside Westminster Abbey and that "discretion" would be used in connection with films of the processions.
